School Reopenings Around the world



1. No surges

- Countries that reopened schools
 - AFTER REDUCING THEIR LEVEL OF INFECTION
 - Have not seen surges of infection



2. Reopenings are exceptions

- Open schools are exceptions, not rule
- Open: 13 countries including:
 - Belgium, Denmark, France, Germany, Greece, Israel, Japan, South Korea, New Zealand, Norway, Switzerland, Taiwan and Vietnam
- Closed: 143 countries



3. Staggering

- Successful reopenings:
 - Staggered with youngest children first
- Greatest failure:
 - Israel: all ages returned
 - Mask requirements dropped (as temperatures soared)
 - Outbreaks
 - 125 schools and 258 KG shut down again in May



4. Shifts / alternate days / smaller size

- Belgium's success:
 - Bring back in shifts
 - Or on alternate days
- Scandinavian nation:
 - Limit class size



5. Hand washing accessibility

- Schools where hand washing was more available
- Fared better than schools where hand washing was difficult to access.



6. What to do if case is detected?

- Some countries closed the entire school again.
- Other countries:
 - Students and teachers of affected classroom
 - Sent into home quarantine
 - For two weeks



7. Not understood

- Overall, at this point in time:
- The extent of the role of children and teens
- In the spread of the coronavirus is NOT really understood



Young Children MORE likely to spread the virus

- August 20, 2020:
 - New study published
 - From MassGeneral Hospital for Children
 - Journal of Pediatrics
- Children younger than five:
 - With mild or moderate illness
 - Have much HIGHER levels of virus in the nose



School Reopenings During 1918 Spanish Flu Pandemic



1. Invest in school nurses

- School nurses were vital:
 - Observed children's health
 - Educated parents
 - Commended by NYC Health Commissioner Royal Copeland
- Today:
 - only 60% of schools: full-time nurse
 - 25% of schools have no nurse at all



2. Partners

- "Planning that brings public health, education officials, and political leaders together"
 - Pivotal to successful responses in schools in 43 cities
- St Louis: best outcome in the country
 - Political, health and education leaders
 - Designed a staggered school reopening
 - With high school first.



3. Tie education to other priorities

- 1916 proclamation:
 - "School is important, but life and health are more important."
 - Establishment of:
 - School lunch programs
 - Large, airy school buildings
 - Built playgrounds
 - Outdoor play areas

- Today: consider adding:
 - ventilation of all indoor spaces
 - Easy access to hand-washing for all



Level of Infection in Your State




How to calculate it

- https://www.cdc.gov/covid-data-tracker/#cases
- Click on tab: Cases per 100,000
- Left-hand column: number per state
- Divide the number by $1,000 \rightarrow$ percentage



How to use this number

- Rule of thumb:
 - If your school has 100 students
 - And your level of infection is 2.7%
 - Then assume that 2-3 of them are infected.
- Plan accordingly:
 - Probably asymptomatic
